LETTER FROM PRESIDENT LINCOLN. Mrs. Bixby—a lady in the southern portion of this city, whose case has excited much sympathy—had six sons enlisted in the Union army, five of whom have been killed in battle, and the sixth is now at the U. S. Hospital at Readville. Being in indigent circumstances, she has received assistance from some of the churches and Christian women of Boston. Her lonely abode was made cheerful this morning by the receipt of the following letter from President Lincoln:

EXECUTIVE MANSION,  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 21, 1864.

Dear Madam,—I have been shown in the files of the War Department a statement of the Adjutant General of Massachusetts, that you are the mother of five sons who have died gloriously on the field of battle.

I feel how weak and fruitless must be any words of mine which should attempt to beguile you from the grief of a loss so overwhelming. But I cannot refrain from tendering to you the consolation that may be found in the thanks of the Republic they died to save.

I pray that our Heavenly Father may assuage the anguish of your bereavement, and leave you only the cherished memory of the loved and lost, and the solemn pride that must be yours, to have laid so costly a sacrifice upon the altar of Freedom.

THIRD ARMY'S PATTON  
The enemy has orders to free him.  
(World Battlefront)







MORNING, 25 JULY: Command group of 3rd Battalion, 47th Infantry is wiped out by bombs falling north of the zone.

1100HRS, 25 JULY: Ground assault begins with immediate objective of seizing Marigny and St. Gilles.

US 9th Division's attack bogs down in the face of resistance from Parachute Regiment 13 which has not been heavily bombed. They only push through the first layer of German defenses, penetrating about a mile, before halting late in the day.

25 JULY: Panzer Lehr's panzer grenadier regiments are supported by the remnants of the division's Panther regiment, with only about a dozen tanks operational.

c.1000HRS, 25 JULY: The weakened Panzer Lehr Division bears the brunt of the bombing.

With Panzer Lehr in danger of evaporating, Paul Hauser, commander of German Seventh Army, orders two infantry regiments to reinforce the key road junction of la Chapelle en Juger.

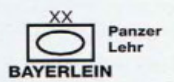
26 JULY: Combat Command B, 3rd Armored Division and 1st Infantry Division drive forward as far as Marigny. By nightfall 1st Infantry Division troops hold the far side of the town.

2nd Infantry Regiment, 4th Infantry Division encounters resistance based around Panzer Lehr's few remaining Panthers. Overcomes them with bazookas and supporting tanks.

26 JULY: 2nd Armored Division advances with its two combat commands abreast. The lead columns carry two rifle companies on each battalion of tanks. By midnight 2nd Armored have penetrated seven miles. General Collins has the breakthrough he is looking for.

26 JULY: Panzer Lehr attempts to hold the St. Gilles road junction with four PzKpfw IV tanks and an assault gun. They are knocked out by air attack and the tanks of 2nd Armored Division. By this point Panzer Lehr has almost completely collapsed.

c.1000HRS, 25 JULY: Main attack by nearly 1,500 B-17 and B-24 heavy bombers and 360 B-26 medium bombers delivers a total of 4,700 tons of bombs.



# CARPET BOMBING OF PANZER LEHR DIVISION

25-26 July 1944, viewed from the south east, showing the initial devastating bombing attacks, the US attacks of 25 July and the breakthrough on 26 July

24-25 JULY: Fritz Bayerlein, divisional commander of Panzer Lehr, orders his units to fall back behind the Periers-St. Lo road to make them less vulnerable to US artillery.

The Periers-St. Lo road (National route 800) is selected as the northern boundary of the carpet bombing zone.

0936HRS, 25 JULY: Air attacks begin with strafing runs by P-47 fighter-bombers along the northern edge of the bomb zone.

MORNING, 25 JULY: 120th Infantry badly hit by bombs north of the zone, General Leslie McNair is killed in 2nd Battalion sector.

30th Infantry Division encounters a defense line based around three Panther tanks. These are eventually overcome and the town of Hébécrevon is finally taken around 2400hrs.

0700HRS: In spite of little resistance 2nd Panzer Division is halted far short of its objective by air strikes and ground attacks.

1200HRS: Combat Command B of 3rd Armored Division prepares to counterattack 2nd Panzer Division spearhead.

1200HRS: 2nd Armored Division moves to St Hilaire and Barenton to seal off possible German advance.

0100HRS: Advance elements of 2nd SS Panzer Division race down the road to St. Hilaire unopposed.

## COUNTERATTACK AT MORTAIN

7 August 1944, viewed from the south east, showing the attacks by 1st SS, 2nd SS and 2nd Panzer Division and the US response.

1600HRS: 116th SS Panzer Division fails to attack and the commander is relieved in the late afternoon. Attack begins but makes no progress.

1200HRS: Germans troops in control of town of St.Barthélemy. US claims 40 German tanks knocked out in the attack.

0010HRS: German mortar fire begins followed by tank assault by 1st SS Panzer Division.

0500HRS: Main German artillery barrage strikes St. Barthélemy.

0545HRS: Tank assault on St. Barthélemy begins.

0900HRS: Fighting in St. Barthélemy peaks.

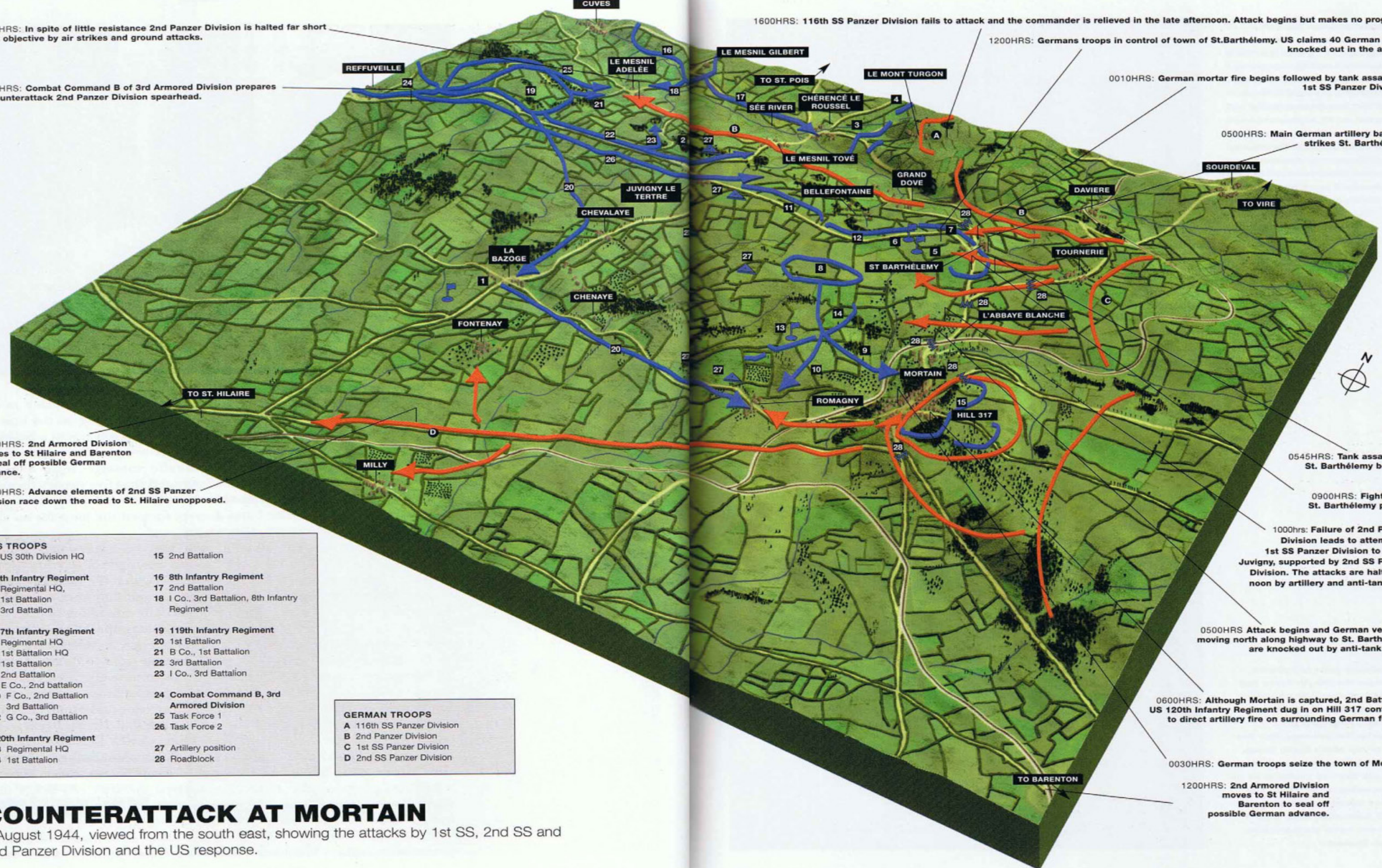
1000hrs: Failure of 2nd Panzer Division leads to attempt by 1st SS Panzer Division to reach Juvigny, supported by 2nd SS Panzer Division. The attacks are halted by noon by artillery and anti-tank fire.

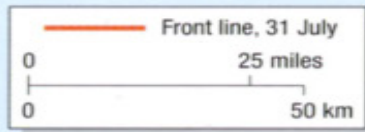
0500HRS Attack begins and German vehicles moving north along highway to St. Barthélemy are knocked out by anti-tank guns.

0600HRS: Although Mortain is captured, 2nd Battalion, US 120th Infantry Regiment dug in on Hill 317 continues to direct artillery fire on surrounding German forces.

0030HRS: German troops seize the town of Mortain.

1200HRS: 2nd Armored Division moves to St Hilaire and Barenton to seal off possible German advance.



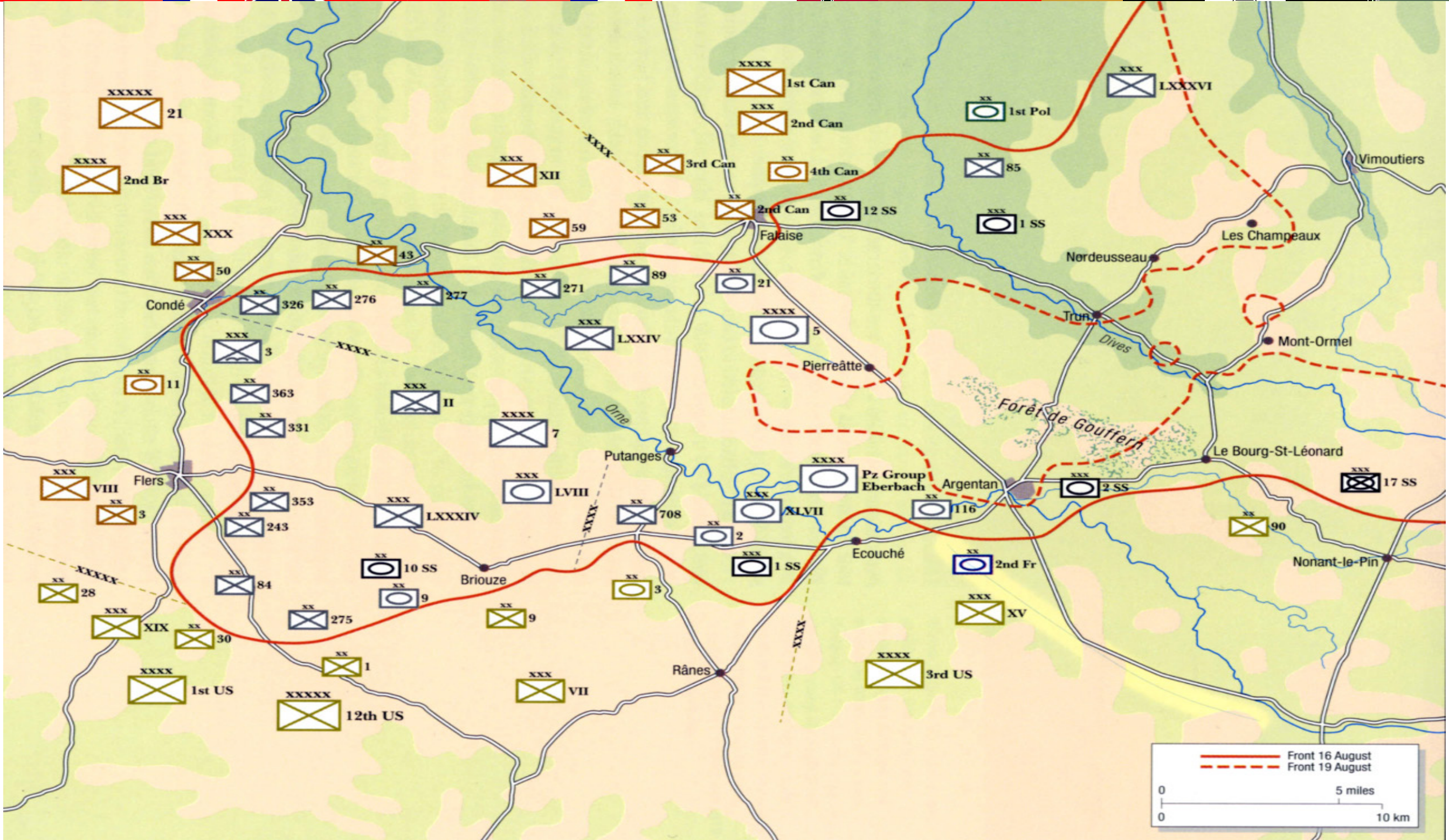
